Gary is no stranger to public benefit corporations, having previously served on the board of directors of the Glendale Symphony Orchestra, and has taken an immediate interest in restoring the SCSRA's membership, which has declined over the past several years. Accordingly, in late February, the writer, Sue Kientz, Jerry Price and Gary met

with FRPA President Dick Hopping to address ways to better synchronize the SCSRA's membership levels, dues and procedures with those of the FRPA. With valuable input from that meeting, a follow-on meeting was held in mid March, chaired by Gary, that included the writer, Sue, Jerry, Dan Price, Tim Riley, Darlene Sexton, Greg Smith, Doug, and Mike and Charity Vitale, and resulted in some specific plans of action:

- Fullerton Railroad Days Sue has formed an SCSRA Booth task force with Greg Smith at the throttle, and Dan Price, Jeff Barrow and others to handle booth setup and staffing, as well as docents for possible caboose tours. A Security task force is formed with Tim Riley and a cadre of volunteers. This year's booth will be 10' x 20' so there'll be room for more generic displays and ample room for M/W displays. More booth volunteers, docents and security people are needed, so please contact Sue and Tim and let them know your availability.
- **Membership Drive** A new brochure will be unveiled at Railroad Days with membership levels and rates identical to FRPA. A focussed drive to attract fallen away members has begun.
- **Development of Projects** While we have several projects "in the wings," we will identify new activities in support of the goals of SCSRA and FRPA. One discussed at the meeting was cleaning up and organizing the MW storage area which we have dubbed "Walnut Yard."

Gary's PR Report in this and coming issues of the newsletter will amplify on the foregoing.

Meanwhile, there has been progress in other areas:

- Mitch Alderman has completed the survey and preliminary design of additional display trackage at the Fullerton Depot to accommodate additional equipment displays, and Dick and the City of Fullerton are reviewing it.
- Arrangements are pending for the City of Fullerton to lease track space at the Fullerton Depot for the cabooses. Their retrieval from Travel Town has been delayed owing to construction delays on the longawaited Locomotive Pavilion, but there is a slim chance they might be moved in time for Railroad Days 2003.
- The FRPA has embraced our Movie Nights as an attractive membership benefit, so we are partnering in this area, as well as the soon-to-be joint newsletter. Our last two screenings were in a real movie theatre, courtesy of **Captain's Family Theatres in Brea**, where our own Tim Dulin provides technical service. By moving our Movie Nights to Wednesdays, which coincide with the FRPA quarterly dinner meetings which are also on Wednesdays, we are assured a continuing welcome at the Brea 5 Theatre, as Wednesdays are traditionally slow in the film exhibition business.
- FRPA had a booth at the recent Model Train Expo, and asked SCSRA if we would like to share it. Dan Price, with help from Jeff Barrow and Darlene Sexton, set up a display and assisted FRPA with booth staffing.

As may be seen, we are alive and well and moving back into the mainstream. Stay tuned for further developments.

CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

At our regular April 2003 meeting, the SCSRA board of directors passed a motion to change our membership basis and dues structure as follows:

- Dues will be on a calendar year basis, e.g., all memberships will expire in December each year, and are renewed beginning in January.
- Levels of support no longer include extra "perks" and match the level names and amounts of FRPA:

Brakeman	\$25
Conductor	\$50
Engineer	\$100
Yardmaster	\$250
Trainmaster	\$500
Benefactor	\$ (e.g., more than \$500)

- The joint membership category of \$40 for FRPA and SCSRA is dropped. This makes sense since both organizations are enjoying the movie nights, and the newsletters of both groups are about to be combined. So whether you belong to one or the other organization, the benefits currently are the same.
- Any new or renewed memberships paid after April 2003 are effective for 2003 and 2004, i.e., will be effective until 12/31/04, at the regular one-year rates shown above.
- The life membership category is discontinued. However, the present nine life members will continue to receive the benefits originally promised for life.

MERIT BADGE PROGRAM, TRAIN TRIPS, AND MORE – IDEAS FOR THE FUTURE

The following are a number of ideas I've been developing, with help and input from the board and others, for activities and goals that SCSRA might consider.

Metrolink Holiday Train. I spoke with Denise Tyrrell, the chief PR person at Metrolink, about our possible participation in helping construct the 2003 Holiday Train. She

was very interested in the possibility of us providing any volunteers. I need a list of those interested by May 15, however, notwithstanding the work does not commence until November. I would like to offer FRPA the opportunity to join us in this venture. It must be underscored that this opportunity is open only to those who have electrical or carpentry skills. terested, e-mail me at the April FRPA dinner. Dinner

A successful relationship with Metrolink on this project will provide us credibility with them in the future for such things such as charter rail trips on their entire system.

Boy Scout Railroad Merit Badge Program. I contacted the lead person for the La Crescenta valley area for the Mormon church scout units; there are six units. We have access, when we are ready, to literally dozens of scout units in our area. I have purchased two handbooks (more are available), along with application forms for merit badge counselor accreditation. Jeff Barrow will assist in this program, with his own church's unit, as well as those from the Mormon church group. Doug Stephens has indicated an interest in helping when we touch on electronic training. We will want to identify other volunteers from SCSRA, and possibly from FRPA, as we get to learn what their skills are.

I recommend we include a poster, with a copy of the handbook displayed, at our Fullerton Railroad Days booth.

Social Activities

I have researched two train ride activities suitable for all members and their families, as well as non-member friends and relatives, both of which could also be fund raising activities for SCSRA and FRPA, I assume split on the basis of participation from each group. In both cases, I volunteer to act as project manager. However, I would not expect a commission, but would rather donate my time.

The Fillmore and Western Railway operates the only dinner train in Southern California, running between Fillmore and Santa Paula. They have a regularly scheduled Saturday evening train, their mystery ride. Originally, it was open to any age. However, children do become noisy. F&W received complaints and raised the minimum age for the murder mystery train to 18. Unfortunately this eliminates many younger families.

They then introduced a train operating on Friday nights, leaving Fillmore at 7 p.m., returning at 9:30 p.m., called the Spaghetti Western Dinner Train. There is no age limit. In addition to an all-you-can-eat spaghetti and meatball dinner, with garlic bread and green salad, beverage, and chef's choice of dessert, they provide entertainers from characters from the Old West – a perfect family outing. The train will run on June 27 and July 18. The train con-

sists of two F-7's, one at each end, three dining cars, and a kitchen car. The capacity of the train is 160.

I believe we could fill the entire train. We would be required to pay a 10% nonrefundable deposit at time of booking. The balance would be due 14 days before departure. Adult tickets are less than \$50 and children under 12, about half that price.

At this time only four reservations have been made for the June trip, none yet for July. Since the SCSRA annual dinner is set for June, perhaps July is a viable date.

The second trip would involve AMTRAK's Pacific Surfliner between Los Angeles and San Diego, with one other boarding station, Fullerton. I have contacted AMTRAK's local marketing personnel. They, too, are most anxious to work with us.

Again, the trip would be on Saturday. Departure from Los Angeles is at 8:30 a.m., with return trip out of San Diego at 7:40 p.m. There are two options to choose from: regular coach, with a car capacity of 90, or Pacific business class at 70 capacity. The business class offers two benefits. One, if we purchase the entire car, there is no reason for passengers other than our group to be in the car, as it is right behind the locomotive -- i.e., no walk-through traffic. The 2nd benefit, AMTRAK provides a continental breakfast in business class.

The retail price ranges from \$72 to \$84, less group discounts, senior citizen rates, children rates, etc. We could use this as a fund-raiser for our organization and keep the price around that figure, or perhaps only slightly higher.

I have discussed catering a box supper for our return trip. This would be an additional cost. AMTRAK has no problem with this.

As to activities in San Diego, I recommend each person choose their own. The activities at Balboa Park, including the model train exhibit, and/or the zoo are a simple bus ride away. The San Diego trolley to Tijuana or Santee is right at the station.

AMTRAK does recommend doing this in June rather than July as passenger load factors are higher in July and August, but to properly publicize this it might have to wait until Fall, to get all the details ironed out.

My recommendation is that we go for both trips, the Fillmore and Western's in July, AMTRAK in August or September. Keeping it to summer months we have a greater chance of attracting entire families.

FRPA SPEAKER TELLS TALES OF PRESIDENTIAL PULLMAN

The last FRPA Quarterly Dinner Meeting in April was really a night to remember. It was there that Mr. Dennis Leslie, dressed in full conductor garb, delighted the assembly of 90 (FRPA's best attendance ever) with stories of when he



worked on the The Ferdinand Magellan, better known as President Franklin Delano Roosevelt's Presidential Pullman.

Mr. Leslie spoke quietly but we all heard him as he told of how the president's specially outfitted train car was protected with ex-

ceptionally heavy armor plating. Clever "righting" devices and an air-tight compartment protected the president in case the car fell into water from off an overpass. The car was so secure that in later years, he said, when the president had the "red phone" and that phone had to be in contact with Washington at all times, in case of a Communist attack, that there was only one way to stick the antenna outside this traincar fortress – down through the toilet! That meant, of course, that no one could use the bathroom during the trip. (The things our politicians suffer, for national security!)

Mr. Leslie was an animated speaker at times, sharing more stories than the ones advertised, and we got the im-

pression that he had many more than that he would have liked to touch upon. He not only brought many wonderful tales, he brought pictures. And not just to display – he brought pictures for us to take home, stacks of photocopies of the car and the presidents who rode in it, one of



SAFETY REPORT

The SCSRA Safety Manual has been moving forward at a slow pace due to preparation for the upcoming Fullerton Railroad Days as Security and Safety Coordinator. The CPR Section of the manual has been completed, and I'm awaiting the conclusion of Railroad Days to pursue my contacts in the American Red Cross to start preparation for a preliminary CPR and First Aid training program which can be offered to all interested SCSRA and FRPA members at low or no cost. CPR and First Aid certification should be required for all members of the Operating Department and for MW supervision to ensure that there is a trained CPR/ First Aid person on site at all times. We still have a long way to go with the manual but, in time, it wil provide an added level of safety for all our active associates.

The planning for Security and Safety at Railroad Days is moving forward. I have a few overnight volunteers but I need more to ensure that the volunteers are rested for the event. Currently, due to the job schedules of our volunteers, my main area of concern is coverage for Friday, May 2, noon through 8 p.m. I need at leastf three volunteers to assist with access to the event site during setup. If anybody can help between these hours on Friday, e-mail me at tim@scsra.org or leave a message at 310-325-0603. Remember, the more volunteers we have, the less we have to work. I'm still working on overnight staff sleeping arrangements, but should have them completed soon.

MECHANICAL REPORT

Cabeese and other Rail Equipment – Plans are underway for moving the cabooses. FRPA has arranged for the City of Fullerton to provide a renewable 6-month lease at a nominal \$1 per term, but we must arrange for insurance naming the City as primary insured.

The cost of the move has been estimated at around \$5,000. Between existing funds we have on hand, and planned fundraising and other means, we expect to have both the moving and insurance costs to bring the cabooses safely to their new home in Fullerton.

The City of LA has granted us an extension on removing the cabooses since Train Shed construction activities have them effectively captive at the park and Train Shed construction has suffered some weather-related delays. Now, we will have 60 days to remove them following notice from the City that they are again accessible to us. Whether the cabooses will be moved before Railroad Days 2003 or after remains to be seen. However, whenever they are moved, we will need to assemble crews to do lots of cleanup and touch-up painting to make them presentable for display and possible scheduled tours.

The Great Move from Travel Town – Thanks to the herculean efforts of Dan Price, Jeff Barrow, Doug Stephens, Darlene Sexton, Dennis Stephens and several others, the Travel Town parking lot has been cleared of all SCSRA property, and what does remain at Travel Town is safely stored in the fenced area south of the parking lot on the east side of Griffith Park Blvd., where the City has assured us it may remain until the new deadline for removal of the cabooses.

OUR GANG

As stated previously, in last quarter's report, on Saturday Jan. 4, 2003, Gordon Bachlund arranged a meeting with Mitch Alderman, Dick Hopping, Jeff Barrow, and Dan Price at the Fullerton Train Station to look at future, joint SCSRA/FRPA track projects. Mitch Alderman, a civil engineer, had very generously donated his time and effort to survey out these future projects. On the 4th Mitch, with assistance from Dan and Jeff, successfully surveyed the Fullerton Train Station's parking lot and two existing railcar storage spurs. The plan is to lengthen those tracks for more storage space during Railroad days.

The organization of our Fullerton MW yard is being planned. This is a big part of the possible upcoming track project. To get to the items that are needed to build the track, the yard must be sorted out.

A few members of the MW dept. also volunteered to staff a booth at "The Big Train Show" in Pomona this quarter. Dan Price, Jeff Barrow, and Darlene Sexton spent a Saturday and Sunday recruiting four new members, talking about future track projects in Fullerton, and helping get the name of the SCSRA to the public, so people can see how we are planning to help the FRPA.

The perpetual project for the MW Dept. of finishing removal of remaining property of the SCSRA from Travel Town continues. Not much is left at Travel Town after the removal of the two Fairmont tie carts from the parking lot to the Fullerton MW yard. Dan Price, Jeff Barrow, Doug Stephens, and Darlene Sexton successfully moved both carts on a U-Haul auto trailer in early March. All went as planned. All remaining items that were located in the parking lot and the forklift were moved up to the zoo drive lot where the crane boom and flat car body are located so that everything is centrally located. These items will be moved when the flat car and boom are moved at a later time.

This is the last issue of the <u>Headlight</u>. In July, the new combined SCSRA-FRPA newsletter will arrive in place of the <u>Headlight</u>.
