# Free Saturday caboose tours will be offered twice monthly

Following several trial runs in recent months, the SCRPA Board of Directors is launching a new program, offering free tours twice monthly of the two cabooses on display at the Fullerton Train Station house tracks.

The tours will be hosted by members of our Railroad Operations Committee (R0C), which has devoted at least one Saturday a month — often more — since 2011, to a dedicated interior refurbishing of the two vintage cars.

We'll offer guided tours to rail fans and the general community from 9 a.m. to noon on the first and third Saturday of each month, beginning in January 2015.

"The railroads were a major part of the building of Fullerton and Southern California. We want to show the public a part of railroading that isn't seen much any more and that a lot of people don't know much about," said Stu Proctor, ROC Chairman.

During an initial test of the program on September 6, board members and ROC volunteers decided to showcase the three beautiful historic cabooses, including a privately owned car, displayed on the house tracks at the east end of the depot. . See "Tours" on Page 2

The two vintage cabooses were opened for tours. A pop-up tent was erected at the west compound entrance, and a sandwich board placed near the Santa Fe Café directed visitors to our cabooses.

Caboose data sheets, membership brochures and assorted past issues of the Hot Rail newsletter were available for interested visitors.

We also provided those who toured with doughnuts and refreshing beverages on the 100-plus degree day.

The response was small but constant, and our expected onehour show stretched to three hours. If not for the heat, the open house could have lasted well into the afternoon.

We had 34 visitors in all – including folks from Atlantic, Iowa; Chicago, Phoenix, Seattle and Anaheim, Buena Park, Fullerton and San Diego.

None of the visitors had any idea the cabooses were at the Fullerton Depot and were pleasantly surprised at the opportunity to stop and explore the cars.

Later in the fall, we will send press releases and advertise our tours – in the local media, at neighborhood businesses and through the school district -- and our visitor count should be substantially higher. Check <u>www.scrpa.net</u> for the scheduled dates and more details.

# SCRPA Movie Night presents a rail-themed Agatha Christie murder mystery

The free Members Retrospective Film Series will finish 2014 with the fulllength thriller, "Murder, She Said" (1961) on October 18 at the Fullerton Museum Center, 301 N. Pomona Ave.

We will begin at 6 p.m. with a wine tasting on the museum patio, sponsored by brothers Alan and Andrew Wiles.

At 6:30, we'll move inside to the auditorium, where we will enjoy an award-winning short subject on snow removal from British railways.

We'll follow with the main attraction, "Murder, She Said," a murder mystery film directed by George Pollock, based on the novel "4:50 from Paddington" by Agatha Christie.

The production starred Margaret Rutherford as Miss Marple, along with Arthur Kennedy and Muriel Pavlow, and featured Rutherford's real-life husband, Stringer Davis.

Wheedling her way into a job as housemaid there, Marple copes with the pompous machinations of her difficult employer, Luther Ackenthorpe (James Robertson Justice).

Thus she can search for the mysterious corpse, and eventually finds it while supposedly practicing her golf shots.

As she starts collecting suspects, accompanied by her longsuffering companion Jim Stringer (Stringer Davis), Miss Marple finds herself faced with an increasingly devious and resourceful killer, who begins casting his shadow over Ackenthorpe's heirs.

Despite Christie's dislike of this adaptation, "Murder, She Said" received a posi-

tive response from critics and maintains an 83% approval rating on Rotten Tomatoes.

Almar Halfidason, a critic for the BBC film website, awarded the picture four stars out of a possible five, calling it "delightfully dotty" and "fun."

# MEET THE VINTAGE 'CABEESE' AT THE FULLERTON TRAIN STATION

### From Hot Rail archives, 2005 & 2006 with updates by Dennis White

ATSF 999110 and SP 4049 are historic relics of a time gone by. Both cabooses were donated to the **Southern California Scenic Railway Association** in 1989 at the end of the caboose era on the American railroads. SCSRA operated both cabooses back and forth on a several-hundred-foot -long section of track in Los Angeles, offering free rides to the public, pushed/pulled by a small industrial diesel locomotive for about 15 years.

But then SCSRA lost their trackage rights in 2005 and a new home for the beloved cabooses had to be found.

The **Southern California Railway Plaza Association** agreed to house the cabooses in Fullerton. Since there was no railroad connection to their previous home, the cabooses had to be trucked to Fullerton's house tracks adjacent to the historic Fullerton Depot in June, 2006.

The cabooses sat unattended in Fullerton until 2010 when deterioration and water damage had reached a point where active conservation of the relics had to begin immediately if the cars were to be saved. SCRPA gained permission to work on the cars in December 2010, followed by creation of its Railroad Operations Committee (R0C) in early January 2011. The first work party was soon held and work continues to this day.

#### ATSF 999110



Atchison Topeka & Santa Fe Railway caboose 999110 was built by American Car and Foundry Company in 1928, part of the series 1650 to 1874, which totaled 225 cabooses. The car is believed to have been originally

numbered AT&SF 1860. During its operating life it was upgraded and/or modified several times, with the addition of generators and lights, radios, a toilet and improved trucks.

The last major upgrade was accomplished at the West Wichita, Kansas, shops (now closed) in 1966, resulting in a configuration called "Class CE-1" which was utilized in mainline and local service system wide. In this final configuration, the caboose is equipped with three pairs of facing bench seats which can be converted into bunks, a conductor's seat and desk and two cupola seats, as well as a heating furnace, a 12V DC refrigerator, Microphor toilet with on-board sewage treatment system, and FRA safety glazing. The caboose's dimensions and weights are:

- Length over pulling faces of couplers 42'1"
- Length over platform end sills 35'3"
- Length over body end sills 26'3"
- Width over side plates 9'7"
- Height, top of rail to top of smoke jack 15'6"
- Weight of body 44,340 lbs.
- Weight of trucks 15,560 lbs.
- Total Weight 59,900 lbs.

The trucks are Barber-Bettendorf swing bolster type with leaf springs and have 33" wheels with roller bearings. The B-end truck is equipped with a 12V DC alternator which charges the 12V battery, providing power for the lights, radio and refrigerator. The heating stove is oil fired.

The caboose was retired by the ATSF, sent to scrap and donated to the Southern California Scenic Railway Association, a SCRPA heritage organization in the fall of 1989

ATSF 999110 is conserved to its "as donated" condition and all onboard utilities are operational including the sewage treatment system which discharges only treated, chlorinated water on the ground in accordance with EPA requirements.

#### <u>SP 4049:</u>



Southern Pacific caboose 4049 was originally numbered SP 1403, part of the series SP 1400 to SP 1599, which totaled 200 cabooses, and built by the Pacific Car and Foundry Company of Renton, Washington, in 1961, at a cost of \$19,000. Originally equipped with seven rotating chairs and two reversible chairs in each bay window, subsequent modernization reduced seating capacity

to five rotating chairs plus two rotating chairs in the windows; replaced the flush hopper toilet with a Microphor self-contained unit with on-board sewage treatment system.

Other changes included replacing two side windows with adjustable vents, plating (covering) non-essential windows, the addition of FRA safety glazing, and installation of a 12V DC refrigerator/water cooler. The caboose's dimensions and weights follow:

- Length over pulling faces of couplers 42'6-3/8"
- Length over platform end sills 38'1-3/8"
- Length over body end sills 32'6-5/8"
- Width over side plates 8'7-5/8"
- Width over bay side sheets 10'6-1/4"
- Height, top of rail to top of roof 12'3-11/16"
- Weight of body 49,960 lbs
- Weight of trucks 15,560 lbs
- Total Weight 65,520 lbs.

The trucks are Barber-Bettendorf swing bolster type with leaf springs and have 33" wheels with roller bearings. The B-end truck is equipped with a 12V DC alternator which charges the 12V battery that supplies power for the lights, radio and refrigerator. The heating furnace is oilfired, and the oil tank is located beneath the single bunk.

The caboose was retired by the Southern Pacific, sent to scrap and donated to the SCSRA in the fall of 1989.

SP 4049 is conserved to its "as donated" condition and all on-board utilities are operational, including the sewage treatment system that discharges only treated, chlorinated water on the ground in accordance with EPA requirements.

In a recent highlight, H&MC received a donation of a 4-foot by 8-foot HO-scale model railroad from a family in Garden Grove. The layout is very simple, with two unconnected loops of track, plus scenery and buildings, making it a good demonstration layout, ideal for a youth group.

H&MC contacted Fullerton youth groups without gaining any interest in the layout. The committee next contacted the La Habra Boys and Girls Club, which gladly accepted the layout donation by the SCRPA.

H&MC members will check, clean and repair the locomotives and rolling stock; check, clean and repair the track and convert the electrical system to a pushbutton control similar to that on our Buddy Young Demonstration layout, which is so popular at Railroad Days. When the work is completed, the layout will be delivered and set up at the La Habra Boys and Girls Club.

Looking ahead, a team from H&MC and ROC will visit the former ATSF baggage/MOW dormitory car 574444 in Anaheim -- to measure the windows preparatory to constructing and installing exact copies of frames and sashes.

The combined committees have several finish carpenters among their membership who have the necessary shop facilities to make this a viable and inexpensive project.

The Historical & Modeling Committee is always looking for members. If local history, rail history, railfanning or model railroading (any scale), interest you and you would enjoy fellowship with others who share these interests, we invite you to become a part of our growing committee. It is a great way to become an active member of the SCRPA.

# ROC moves forward with caboose work and adds cart projects

The Railroad Operations Committee continued its Work Parties (emphasis on "work") through the summer months at the Fullerton Depot.

We began cleaning and organizing the storage cabinets in both vintage cabooses. We also completed extensively photographing both exteriors to document the location of stenciling, lube plates, etc. in preparation for stripping and repainting.

Vandalism continues to be a problem inside the enclosure, with wooden steps being moved and one of them broken. They will be moved inside the cabooses when not in use.

On August 16, the two baggage carts we acquired from the city in April were moved to an area near the cabooses. The oak decking of the predominately metal, rubber-tired cart was removed and the wood trashed.

The oak pieces of the predominately wooden, metalwheeled cart were measured and drawn up for size and placement of mortises and tendons. Some of the wooden pieces were removed from the cart.

In an impromptu extra session on August 30, the rest of the wooden pieces of the cart were removed and disposed of, leaving just the wheels, the fifth-wheel steering mechanism and miscellaneous steel brackets and fittings. Most of the bolts and nuts holding everything together had to cut off with either a grinder or a reciprocating saw. New nuts and bolts will be purchased when needed.

Measurements and photos were also taken of both baggage carts to determine what materials will be needed and what plan of action will be taken to restore both carts.
